Dear Fay Jones School First-Year Students, Transfer Students, and Parents:

Welcome and congratulations on your admission to the University of Arkansas and to the Fay Jones School of Architecture and Design!

You will be receiving a lot of important information from the University and the Fay Jones School, but please pay close attention to this letter as it provides our recommendations for acquiring a computer and software to support your coursework and degree requirements over the course of your degree studies.

Undoubtedly, the computer is an essential tool for our new students and critical to your success in academic and professional pursuits in architecture, landscape architecture, and interior design. As you consider this purchase, bear in mind that a design education differs from the other curricula in the University: our courses do require textbook purchases, but to a lesser extent than in other Colleges or Schools. Our coursework relies on the tools of the hand for learning through drawing and making – and the computer is one of those fundamental tools. This laptop and software package will serve as a basic, but versatile, toolkit and can support your design studies during your Fay Jones School education.

If you purchase the School-specified laptop computer from the UA bookstore you will receive the most substantial value with preferential pricing through educational discounts and bulk purchasing as well as possess the same computer hardware and software package as the majority of students in the program. Be assured the School receives no income from these purchases, but our experience has shown clear advantages for students who purchase a standard laptop computer that is supported by the School's digital technologies staff. Again, this is a highly specific package, with preferential pricing.

We recommend buying your computer with the specifications outlined on our website <https://archlabs.uark.edu/>. Further, **we recommend that the computer be added to your homeowner or renter's insurance policy**; as a portable laptop, it will not be locked down in the design studios.

General Safety

Any action that obstructs, disrupts, damages or physically interferes with the use and/or security of the facilities and its occupants is prohibited. This includes, but is not limited to, prying or forcing open doors to the building, propping open exit or fire doors and/or denying access or exit from any doorway. **The minimum fine and restitution for any of these offenses is \$500.**

Fire Safety

It is Arkansas State Law and a policy of the University that when a fire alarm sounds, the building must be evacuated immediately. (Do not wait to see if there is a “real” fire – if there is a fire, seconds matter!)

If you hear an alarm, WALK to the nearest exit and leave the building. DO NOT USE THE ELEVATOR. Once outside, move away from the building to a safe distance, allowing a clear path for emergency vehicles.

Failure to evacuate during an active fire alarm is illegal and leaves you subject to judicial sanctions. Tampering with or disabling smoke and heat detectors is not allowed. **The minimum fine and restitution for any of these offenses is \$500.**

TUITION & FEES

University of Arkansas Tuition and Fees – All Majors

Tuition and fees are charged per credit hour and are set forth by the University of Arkansas based on approval of the Board of Trustees. Educational expenses will vary according to a student's course of study, personal needs and place of residence. To estimate your University tuition and fees, go to:

Teaching Equipment and Laboratory Enhancement (TELE) Fees – All Majors

Telefees are used to provide and maintain state-of-the-art classroom equipment and instructional equipment. They are assessed on a per-credit-hour basis. Currently, Telefees for the Fay Jones School are \$32.60* per credit hour.

Studio Fee – Interior Design Only

Students in the interior design program are assessed a fee (currently \$15.00 per credit hour*) each semester they are enrolled in an interior design studio course. **The Studio Fee is non-refundable with no exceptions.**

Studio Field Trips – All Majors

Students enrolled in our professional degree programs can expect to travel once or twice a year with their design studios. Instructors provide estimated cost per student as far in advance of travel as possible. Students should budget \$500-\$900 per studio field trip.

Travel Fee – Interior Design Only

Students in the interior design program are assessed a fee (currently \$100 per semester*) each fall and spring semester, which is subsequently applied to the cost of studio field trips. **Travel Fees are non-refundable with no exceptions.**

International Study Fee – Architecture and Landscape Architecture Only

All students in the professional programs of Architecture and Landscape Architecture are required to study abroad. Architecture students typically spend a semester at the University's Rome Center in the spring of fourth year or the fall of fifth year. (A summer program in Mexico is often an option as well.) Landscape Architecture students travel to the Rome Center in the summer following their second year. A fee of \$656.75* per semester (fall and spring) is assessed each student until they study abroad for the support of the School's international programs. This fee helps offset costs of maintaining off-campus programs that are not a part of the School's University-funded budget. When the student studies abroad, they will be assessed for any remaining semesters plus any additional program costs not covered by the international study fees. **International Study Fees are non-refundable with no exceptions.**

*Fees are subject to change at any time.

SUPPLIES AND COMPUTER SPECS

Supplies

All students entering first-year design studio are required to purchase an “architecture supply kit” from the University Bookstore. The cost of the kit is approximately \$450.00 (subject to change) and includes everything the student needs to begin design studio. Additional supplies will be needed each semester based on project requirements. Students should budget \$300-\$500 per semester for supplies and printing/plotting.

 - MATH 2053 – Finite Mathematics
- Must complete University Core Requirements prior to entry to Design VII (fourth year)

Students who do not meet the above requirements will be notified via email and advised accordingly.

GRADING SCALE and CALCULATING YOUR GRADE POINT AVERAGE

Courses taken through the Fay Jones School are graded on the “plus and minus” system. Below are point values for each grade.

To calculate your total grade point average (GPA):

1. Add the total number of credit hours attempted.
2. For each course, multiply the points earned by the number of credit hours.
3. Divide Total Points by Total Credit Hours.

Example: Lex just completed first semester at the Fay Jones School of Architecture + Design, majoring in Interior Design. Below are the courses Lex completed, along with credit hours and grades for each:

To calculate Lex’s GPA, divide 51.65 total points by 16 credit hours. That equals **3.228**.
